

Celebrating at Stone Train Station

Over 100 people joined North Staffordshire Community Rail Partnership (CRP) and volunteers at Stone Station on Wednesday 13th March for their Community Open Day celebrating the work of the station volunteers and the recent station improvement projects.

Clients from Futures2gether provided a pop-up café offering refreshments, the Bumblebee Conservation Trust offered seed bomb making activities, AEDdonate provided demonstrations on using a defibrillator, North Staffs CRP gave a guided Rails to Trails walk from Stone Station into Stone Town and pupils from St Dominic's Priory School entertained with their spring themed poems. The event was also attended by West Midlands Trains, Network Rail, Stone Town Council and North Staffs Rail Promotion Group.

Rail Promotion Group. Photo boards displayed the station improvement projects, funded by London Northwestern Railway, including new planters, rainwater harvesting, school projects, defibrillator and volunteering days. Attendees also got to vote for their favourite pollinator friendly planting arrangement and the winning arrangement will be used to plant up the two new planters on platform 2.

Station volunteers Barbara and Rachel provided information about their work and station projects and attendees shared their thoughts via a feedback wall at the event. Comments included:

Those attending the open day were amongst the first to view the new history panel recently installed on platform 2 which features information about the history of the station, and the town, as well as the Stone Rails to Trails walk which passes many of Stone's historic attractions.

The history panel was funded by London Northwestern Railway, with information and images supplied by Stone Town Council and Philip Leason.

Your paper Sir, a peak into retailing history!

Dear Dan,

To the uninformed onlooker the sale of a newspaper across a shop counter has no magic, requires little or no skill or technique - you select the newspaper of your choice, you pay for it and you leave - end of story!

There is a simple magic in the act of handing the newspaper to the customer; do you simple let the customer pick their own or push forward a copy of the required journal to facilitate easy lifting?

Do you lift the paper to meet the oncoming customers hand or do you lift the paper, fold in neatly in half and then place it carefully in the customer's outstretched hand. Which hand do you place it in if no hand if proffered, is he or she left or right handed or even ambidextrous, does the customer have something on one or other hand, money for example?

Stone Choral Society

Stone Choral Society's Spring concert took place on Saturday 16th March 2024 in St Dominic's Priory Hall. The evening was one of the most beautiful choral singing; the programme comprised many sacred choral greats and Fauré's beautiful and evocative Requiem.

The concert opened with Fauré's "Cantique de Jean Racine"; a beautiful piece written by the 19-year-old composer and hints at the dignity of the Requiem written later. Many sacred choral favourites were also performed in the first half of the concert. This delighted both the choir and the audience. This music is so moving in the springtime. As always, we sang under the direction of Harriet Johnson, our Choral Director and accompanied by Jennifer Hames.

The first half included Bruckner's "Locus Iste"; a haunting motet sung acapella by the choir and other favourites such as Bach's equally haunting motet "O Jesu Christ, meins Lebens Licht" with all its rich Baroque tones and Mozart's Ave Verum that never fails to hit a chord and is so universally known and loved.

Two teenage soloists joined us on the stage; this was their first concert with us. They both sang solos in the first half before taking on the soprano and baritone solo parts in the Requiem. Isaac Bentley sang first and enchanted the audience with his renditions of Benjamin Britten's arrangement of the traditional "The Salley Gardens" closely followed by the operatic aria "Salut! Aaron Pope, a 24 year old track cyclist from Stone, won gold in the men's 1km time-trial at the National Track Championships in March. He set a time of 1:02.172

Aaron has spent the last four years in Exeter completing a master's degree in Sport Science at the University of Exeter. Despite being diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes in 2018 and initially being told that he wouldn't be able to exercise at a high level, he took up track cycling a year and a half ago.

He has since achieved notable successes, including winning the 2024 British Kilo Championship, the 2023 BUCS Kilo Championship, and securing 1st place in Round 2 and 2nd place in Round 5 of the 2023 National Sprinters League. He will now officially compete in DerbyWheel, bringing the often thrilling environs

He will now officially compete in DerbyWheel, bringing the often thrilling environs of Keirin racing to a global audience, having previously been a closed domestic enterprise in Japan and Korea where it continues to be a hugely successful spectator sport.



Two years in the making, DerbyWheel will bring the often thrilling environs of Keirin racing to a global audience, having previously been a closed domestic enterprise in Japan and Korea where it continues to be a hugely successful spectator sport.

DerbyWheel is a Professional Keirin League with equal accessibility for the entire cycling family, looking to grow the economic model of track cycling to support riders, venues and federations across the globe, all with the ambition of bringing Pro Keirin racing to the masses.

Keirin racing has a rich history, beginning in 1948 in Japan. In its homeland, the Keirin is raced primarily on outdoor 400m tracks and is all about sports betting, being one of only five sports that it's legal to bet on. DerbyWheel will establish events across multiple territories utilising indoor 250m velodromes to bring more intensity to the traditional format. It will also be the first time many Japanese and Korean Keirin specialists will go head to head against international riders bringing a new dynamic to the racing as east meets west on the velodrome boards.

Speaking about the launch of DerbyWheel, Ross Edgar said: *"I was immediately excited about the vision of DerbyWheel. As a former track sprinter and Keirin medalist the benefits were clear for the sport, particularly for riders."*

In professional track cycling, only a small percentage of riders reach the pinnacle of the sport and compete for Olympic medals. DerbyWheel will provide a steady platform for current and developing riders to perform and continue their careers for longer and continue doing what they love."

It was an honour to be invited to ride the Japanese Keirin, through my career I would have spent almost a year racing there and had many memorable experiences - it was something all western riders hoped they would get invited to. I wish DerbyWheel had been around when I was a rider, so I'm excited to be part of the team bringing this to life for the current and future generations of track sprinters. In my opinion, Keirin really is the best race on the track."

A participant from Staffordshire Wildlife Trust's youth group, 'Wilder Youth', has created a petition to try and get a series of living roof bus shelters across Staffordshire.

22-year-old Laura Gerrard is working to demonstrate the local support for this project, in the hope that Staffordshire County Council will look into installing a series of living roof bus shelters (also known as 'Bee Stops') across the county.

Living roof bus shelters can support our native bees and butterflies by providing vital links between our parks and gardens. They can also reduce the strain on drains by absorbing rainwater, which in turn helps with flood-risk and management. These bus shelters can also actively capture pollution and particulates from the air.

Laura told My Village Voice "Living roof bus shelters have already been extremely successful in other counties, and it would be fantastic to also see them across Staffordshire. These shelters are a really cool way to incorporate more native plants into our cities and roadsides, and also provide extra space for bees and other wildlife to find respite in our developing county."

The speaker at the Stone Probus luncheon in March was Paul Niblett a longterm volunteer at the Gladstone Pottery Museum, Longton, Stoke on Trent.

Paul spoke in some detail and showed slides of the landmark 'Last Firing of a Bottle Oven in the Potteries in 1978'. This took place at Sutherland China situated across the road from the Gladstone Pottery.

Special dispensation had to be obtained from the City Council before this firing could take place because of the 1956 clean air act which prohibited the burning of polluting coal in industry in the City. The firing took 12 tons of Florece Nuts (*premium local coal*) to complete, hence in the past when many such ovens were in full use the City was rather unkindly referred to as 'Smoke-on-Trent'.

Much of the fascinating detail and unique pottery terminology can be found in a short You Tube video – titled 'Alfred Clough talks about the last Bottle Oven Firing in 1978.' This short film brings home just how much human skill and effort went into making the ware which put Stoke on the world map all those years ago.

"Walk of the Month" From The Stone Ramblers

Oh, my goodness, when will it stop raining?

We have certainly been testing our waterproof gear!

A huge thank you to the brave souls that came to visit us in the pouring rain at the recent Farmers' Market and a reminder that we will have a stall at the opening of Westbridge Park on **Saturday 27th April**. We will be giving out pens and badges and also, a list of some future short walks, that we hope you will join us on, to sample the Stone Ramblers. You will also have to opportunity to purchase our walking books, 'Stone Circles' and 'Walks Around Stone'.



I've been doing a lot of reading during this wet spell and have recently finished 'Little Dibbling' by Bill Bryson. It's so good, I can highly recommend it. Bill is American and loves the UK and says, 'What a joy it is to walk in England and Wales, that has 130,000 miles of public footpaths, that's about 2.2 miles for every square mile of area. People in Britain don't realise how extraordinary that is. If there is one thing that I enjoy and admire in Britain, it is the pleasure of being on foot and at large in the open air.' Well said Bill, you should join the Stone Ramblers!



In February we had a wonderful weekend away in Shropshire, walking around Bishop's Castle and a group of us are off to Coniston later this month for a week of walking and exploring. We can't wait and hope that the weather improves, well it can't really get any worse.

Walk of the Month: Moddershall

Moddershall is a peaceful village noteworthy for the large Millpool in its centre. The mill house, now demolished, stood opposite the Boar Inn and also carried the name of Boar Mill. Built in 1798 and in operation until 1958 crushing lime and flint for the pottery industry. This was the highest of 11 mills in the Moddershall Valley (*now a Conservation Area*) on Scotch Brook as it flows the two miles down to Stone

Distance: 4 miles Time: 2 hours Refreshments: the Boar Inn, Moddershall, the Rook House Tea Room, Moddershall and the Spot Gate Inn, Spot Gate. Please check for opening times.

Terrain: The going is mainly level, apart from an uphill section close to Idlerocks and a downhill section on the return to Moddershall. Please expect some mud along the way as this has been one of the wettest seasons on record! There are 11 stiles to cross.

1) We start at the Boar Inn in the delightful village of Moddershall. Parking is available opposite the pub.

We proceed by walking into the rear car park and leave by the waymarked path on the left. After 75 yards we come to a surfaced lane and turn left up the hill.

We continue along the lane as it becomes unsurfaced and pass through a gate and alongside a high fence. Look out for the deer enclosure, on the right. On one particular day we saw hundreds of deer but be warned this section can be particularly muddy. Now start to steadily climb up the valley, known as Idle Rocks, for about 1 mile, taking care of the ditch

Approach the top of the valley, cross a stile into a steep field aiming for the top right hand corner. Cross a stile and walk behind a post and rail fence leading on to a track. From the track, cross a further stile directly in front and follow the path between hedges up to the main Hilderstone Road.



2) Crossing the road we enter a wood, Stallington Heath and following the path through the wood you will soon join the line of the boundary fence which we follow. On the other side of the fence is an SSI, Site of Special Interest, which often has a good display of orchids.

After a further 200 yards we come to a surfaced track and turn right and in a further 75 yards turn left and on to Fulford Lane passing the Kattery. At Sandy Lane we turn right.

3) We proceed along Sandy Lane for about ½ mile to the crossroads, go straight across into Balaams Lane and then proceed until we take a track on the right in 100 yards. As we pass Flatts Farm the track becomes a path which we follow until we come to a stile under a holly arch. We



should now follow the edge of a broom coppice as we start to descend to the rear of the Spot Gate Inn. (You will often see wild rabbits in this area)

Crossing the road in front of the pub, enter a wood which has way marked route to the left of an overgrown lake. We pass through an area of rhododendron woods with a deep ditch on the left. We should now leave the wood by a stile in the left corner and walk up the track to the lane

4) Turn left along the lane, walk facing on-coming traffic, proceeding past the cricket ground until we come to a junction on the right. On the left is a stile hidden under the hedge. Crossing the stile we are in an open field which we cross diagonally right pausing at the trig point to observe the distant views of the Shropshire and Welsh Hills with the nearer Wrekin, usually very distinct.

Continuing on the diagonal route, first crossing a stile in the hedge and then across the next field to the bottom left-hand corner where we will find and cross a hidden double stile. We now proceed up the incline to cross the stile alongside a field gate and follow the track down the field to a stile alongside a cottage.

Turning right we proceed back to the Boar Inn and the Rook House Tea Room at the other end of the village passing the Old School House and Village Hall on the way.

This walk is taken from our '*Stone Circles*' book and we should make you aware that over the years, changes can occur to footpaths, so please let us know, if you spot any.

Sandon and Burston Parish

Sandon and Burston are two villages that are south of Stone on the A51 where the River Trent, the Trent and Mersey Canal, the main London to Manchester railway route and the A51 all run within 100m of one another.

The A51 was in fact one of the foremost coaching routes in the country, providing access from London to Holyhead from where shipping and modern ferries crossed to Dublin and dominates the two villages.

The two villages also lie on the Two Saints Way a pilgrimage route from Lichfield to Chester, with the 'stretch' from Stone to Burston being very popular with local walkers. Although the route is currently closed at Burston because the footbridge over the River Trent is waiting for repairs following last year's storms.

Sandon, the bigger of the two villages, is dominated by the Estate, the ancestral home of the Harrowby family and goes back many centuries to a time when the Lord of the Manor was Lord Erdswyck in the 1300s.

Burston is equally historical and goes back many centuries to the Dark Ages. With the majority of its houses being developed in the 1700 and 1800s by the Stubbs family, albeit with several much older properties.

Today, Sandon and Burston are joined together and represented by Sandon and Burston Parish Council, which meets every two months at the parish rooms. For more details see **sandonburston.staffslc.gov.uk**.

The parish council meetings are of course open to the public and meetings are open to public discussion about local matters. One of the main local concerns is the traffic speed and safety on the A51, and the roads leading from it, and it is the intention of the Parish Council to consider how to lobby the County Council and Highways Authority to explore how to improve the situation.

Another Parish Council initiative has been to provide some planters (*see pic above*) to brighten up the two grass triangles in Burston, which are maintained by The Oak Tree Rural Farm Project in Hilderstone (**oaktree farm.uk.net**) and it is hoped that a similar project will happen in Sandon.

Updates on Stone Station

North Staffs Rail Promotion Group continue to campaign to get a better train service for Stone Station.

NSRPG chair, Jon Heal, says that it really is a struggle in 2024. "The London Northwestern Railway service was cut in two in December, so Stone has lost its direct service to the West Midlands," says Jon. "Several people have contacted us to say this has had a drastic impact on their daily journeys to work. We are putting together a summary of the impact that passengers pass on to us."

NSRPG welcome comments on the December changes, and are in regular contact with train planners. Sadly, the train companies are forced to cut costs whatever the outcome for passengers.

Two local people started petitions and collected names of nearly 2000 people who objected to the changes. Sadly this has had little response from West Midlands Trains, who operate the LNWR service . "They tell us that the service is running well," says Jon, "but this is not really true. Trains seem to be turning up on time, but that's not a great help for people who have lost the direct service to their place of work. There are just fewer trains to Birmingham, so the Cross Country ones that do still run are overcrowded, and they don't stop here!" The recent NSRG meeting in Stone Station attracted

The recent NSRG meeting in Stone Station attracted several new members who are keen to join the campaign for a return to a good service. NSRPG thank The Stone Gazette for advertising the meetings.

An event that also attracted a good crowd was an Open Day organised by North Staffs Community Rail Partnership. The station was open with several local groups and school children taking part. "We hope the representatives from Network Rail and train companies went home aware of the enthusiasm for the station and its importance in the life of the town," says Jon Heal. "The small group of volunteers have done wonders in recent years."

One surprise was a large information and tourist board that had suddenly appeared on the platform. If you want to know about Stone, here is a start! Thanks to Stone Town Council for providing the information.


All of the town centre public houses have been on the cover, along with an assortment of other Eccleshall pics, and of course many various photographs of Holy trinity Church from assorted angles.

From pocket watches to longcase clocks which Percy Tildesley made and mended, and it was evident by his mug on the table that he made time for tea during his busy day. The Doctors surgery houses an array of antiquated instruments. A pottery inhaler, stethoscope and forceps, to assist delivery. But why did he have leeches, we wondered.

Sad to see the pawnbrokers shop, where items on display had been taken in from those who had fallen on hard times. The sweet shop brought back memories of Coltsfoot Rock and stick striped humbugs, weighed out from large jars.

Toys of yesteryear brought childhood back into sharp focus and some said lve got one of those in my loft . Cheerfully the teddy bears were enjoying a picnic, which brought us back to the 21st century.

A worthy and enjoyable visit made even more palatable by coffee in the lovely surroundings.

A potted history of the public house The Darlaston Inn

Literally millions of people have either passed the Darlaston Inn, or in much smaller numbers have called in.

To begin with, looking at the date of 1685, the year that Charles II died, it would appear that very few would have known the Inn was that old.

The pub has gone through a few changes over its lifetime (*and is about to be demolished anytime soon*).

I was the landlord of The Darlo as it was known as from 1977-1984, the road layout being changed to provide a more substantial bridge able to cope with huge loads that came from Alstrom (*formerly The English Electric Co*) in Stafford.

In my early years I lived up the road from the Darlo, so I remember when it was a single carriageway, the road south passing the front of the building and heading for the George and Dragon pub, now on the old A34 road on the other side.

In its much earlier days the building had three uses, a public house, a village bakery, and last but not least, the local lock - up! All the essentials for a village in them days.

Everyone will be familiar with the pub and bakery but not quite so with the lock- up, it was what it said, anyone breaking the the law, being arrested would be put in the local lockup overnight then carted to Stone to face the beak- local magistrate, the next day.

When I first saw the layout of the pub it struck me that a lot of it didn't make sense, why did the wine and spirits store have bars on the windows, no glass, but bars and a door that was about 5'8" high, the height of a man at the time of building, it did present a good reason for one to duck or grouse, I'm 6'4".

The door itself could have stopped a rhinoceros!

Little evidence suggested a bakery on first glance, but looking at the roof one could see a stack of chimneys that had no use downstairs, there was however a place where the ovens would have been.

We had a wall removed in the part of the building that would have been for customers of the bakery and found a plaque with a date of 1685 on it.

On the very large car park there had been a space that catered for coach parties, this would have been in the sixties, one of its features was a football ground style turnstile, I've no idea what was about? The building however came to a sticky end when a lorry carrying a large load of cheese came down Bury bank (opposite the Darlo) failed to negotiate the bend and finished up with just the rear of the lorry in view right in the middle of the cafe - end of!

All the locals never bought any cheese for ages!

During the 1980's the pub underwent a major renovation, before I left the pub I was asked what I would do with it if it was mine - ackrow prop it up, and punch it out was my reply - nothing is where it should be.

That is exactly what they did - I forgot to mention that I hadn't got the 650k to do it myself.

Age Concern Stone and District offer a friendly smile and a chat as we guide our clients through the many questions asked when filling in forms online. Our volunteers use their digital expertise to assist clients to access help and fill in the online forms which can baffle so many people.

We help with Housing Benefit, Pension Credits, Council Tax, Attendance Allowance, and other benefits applications. In applying for a Blue Badge (*this gives you the right to parking concessions if you have a disability or a health condition*) the form asks for a photograph of an exact size, and it needs to be scanned in, we will take your photograph to the specifications needed. A birth certificate, driving licence or passport as proof of who you are, proof of address (such as a utility bill) and a few other things are required, they too need to be scanned in. **You do not need to be a driver to apply for a Blue Badge.**

We are often asked for help with tax queries and contacting electricity and gas companies, applying via the telephone means you can be on hold for very long periods of time, which can be very costly if you use a pay as you go mobile. We will make those calls for you and hold on for as long as it takes to get an answer, we will then speak on your behalf once permission is given.

As well as the mundane, we still have time for fun!

Our **coffee mornings are every Friday from 10 am**, Persey the dog sometimes makes a guest appearance in the hope someone might give him a biscuit while his owner isn't looking!

We hold a **lunch club the last Tuesday of the month** (*free transport, pay for your own food and drink*). We also offer transport to hospital appointments, with the return charge to Stoke or Stafford Hospital approximately £13. Our driver will wait for you while you attend your appointment or if required will attend the appointment with you. We are a local charity with no wage bill, all our volunteers are local and give their time and smiles for free (*though a donation is always appreciated*).

We offer a private consultation room with all matters treated in total confidence. You can find us at 15 Station Road Stone, opposite the side of Wetherspoons. **Our opening times are 9.30 – 12.30 Monday Wednesday and Friday** if you call out of hours, please leave a message on 01785 817906 and we will get back to you.

If you like people, we need a few more volunteer drivers, suitable qualifications are, being able to listen, able to smile and a willing attitude.

Finally, our super star volunteer Janice Curtis is raising money to bring help and hope to those affected by dementia. She is taking part in the Alzheimer's Society Trek26. A walk of 26 miles over tough terrain through the Peak District.

• Within Living Memory - With Philip Leason MBE

50 years of changes to the roads in Stone By Philip Leason MBE

One of the major changes to the town of the last fifty years are those effecting the road layout of the town. This month I thought we would look at some of them.

Walking down High Street today it is hard to imagine that this was once a two way road with pavements either side. There was a bus stop outside Elkes Cake Shop, later Joules Off Licence (*now part of B & M*) for the Service number 10 to Hanley. (*The stop for the Stafford bus was located by the public conveniences in Station Road and the bus then drove down High Street.*)

The only entrance to Mill Street was via High Street and so lorries going to the Cattle Market (now Morrison's Garage) and to the factories located down there had to make the sharp turn opposite the Crown Hotel. On one occasion a vehicle making the turn hit the portico of the Crown and dislodged one of the pillars, also causing it to collapse.

To easy the flow of traffic in the High Street "a one way system" was introduced with traffic going up Crown Street as it is now, but then being able to turn to go down the High Street. There is a lovely story on the first day this was introduced, the police stopped an elderly man driving up the High Street and when he was asked if he knew it was now a one-way street he replied "Yes but I didn't think that applied to residents."

On the subject of Crown Street many readers may remember that until the 1960.s the road was not a thoroughfare but was blocked off at the rear of the Crown Hotel.

CHRISTCHURCH WAY

From before the Second World War there were plans to build a by-pass and pedestrianize the High Street. Over the years various schemes were proposed but never came into fruition. The route varied and one of the previous schemes suggested that traffic left the Longton Road and followed the Scotch Brook through the Coppice. As we know the eventual scheme joined the by-pass in Radford Street, with working starting in 1993. Room, which was used by various organisations for meetings, social events etc. This together with the house previously mentioned was purchased by the former Stone Urban District Council for *"highway purposes"* and demolished. It was later used for informal car-parking before the land was incorporated into the by-pass.

Near to this land was the Christchurch Youth Building which was used by scouts, cubs, Brownies and Guides.

Before moving on it is perhaps appropriate to mention how the road was named Christchurch Way. Stafford Borough Council is the responsible Authority for the naming of all roads and streets within the

Borough area. They decided that as there was a tremendous interest in the name for the new road, they invited members of the public to submit suggestions for consideration either directly or via the Stafford and Stone Newsletter.

Christchurch Middle School also looked at the name as a project, and various pupils put forward names including Falcon Inn Road, Stone Age Road and Water Way Avenue.

However the most popular name among the pupils was Christchurch Way, as suggested by 12 year old Philip Clark.

The Headteacher, Mrs Betty Leslie wrote to Stone Town Council and the Borough Council and pupils wrote to Borough Councillors asking them for their support to name the road Christchurch Way.

All the names that had been

To make way for the new road thirty-five bodies in the churchyard at Christchurch had to be exhumed by a specialist contractor and were later reinterred.

Many readers may remember the house that once stood on the site where you enter the by-pass, number 11 Radford Street. It was originally the house of the Schoolmasters of Christchurch School in Northesk Street, but was later used as a dental surgery by Mr. Gerry O'Donnell.

Behind the house stood Christchurch Parish

market to buy alcohol, the licencing hours for the Unicorn, the Red Lion and the Crown Hotel were extended to 5.00 p.m.on market days.

In addition to selling livestock the market also sold dressed poultry at a special sale just before Christmas. The Cattle Market closed in May 1994

submitted were considered by the Development Services st Committee on 26th January, 1995 and they felt that as the name Christchuirch Way had been nominated by school children, the future generation, they would support the suggestion.

Going back to the route and much of the land was owned by the Bass Brewery who had acquired it following the Joules takeover. Joules had originally purchased the land with a view to possible expansion and while it was not needed rented it to their employees as allotment gardens.

Next to the allotments was

the Cattle Market which had been established in 1834. I am sure that many readers will have memories of the market. Until 1957 the Cattle Market was held on a Tuesday but this was changed to a Thursday which caused problems for those attending the market for Thursday was early closing day in Stone. It was largely as a result of this change that early closing day was changed to a Wednesday.

In the days when the licencing laws were more restrictive, public houses closed at 3.00 p.m. but to allow people attending the cattle

A little further down the route was a three storey building that had been used by Broadcrown Ltd. The building had originally been a Fustian Mill in the 19th century and was partially destroyed by fire on 26th December, 1993 prior to it being demolished for the construction of the road. Fustian was a type of velvet being a mixture of linen and cotton. Bails of plain fabric where brought to Stone from Congleton and the threads cut by hand to produce the pile. The workers who cut the threads were paid according to the lengths of cloth they had cut and reductions were made if the warp had accidently been cut as well. Once completed the bails were returned for dyeing. Other buildings which had to be demolished in this area were the old stables and outbuildings of the Falcon Inn (now the Thai Larna). In the 1920's the owners, Bents Brewery, modernised the pub and incorporated a wine bar featuring artificial vines etc. which they named "Wine Land." The name can still be seen on the inn sign on the side wall of the building.

The Falcon remained a pub until the early 1980's when it was sold by Bass (who had taken over Bents). It then became a disco known as "The Doll's House" and later a night club and restaurant known as "Changes."

Later it became a French restaurant and while building work on Ken Rodgers Insurance Office (which was opposite) was being undertaken as part of constructing the road, the office was moved to the old Falcon for a short period. As part of the preliminary work for the new road archaeological excavations were undertaken at various sites.

In August 1993 Birmingham University Field Archaeology Unit on behalf of Staffordshire County Council and Seven Trent Water undertook a dig in the old Falcon Yard.

Once the construction of the road had been completed it was formally opened by the then County Councillor for Stone, Councillor John Wakefield on Monday 13th February, 1995.

THE GATES VERUS BOLLARDS SAGA

No article on the construction of Christchurch Way would be complete without mention of the Gates or Bollards Saga.

In 1997 as a result of building Christchurch Way, the County Council allocated 1% of the capital sum of the building of the road for an artistic project to improve the access to the town. Recommendations for the project had been channelled through the Town Council who were in favour of a pair of ornamental gates at the top of the High Street and they had consulted three artists for designs. However they were not satisfied with what they had submitted and so a fourth artist was consulted.

A large number of residents, and particularly the traders in Granville Square and Radford Street were totally opposed to the idea of gates which they felt would shut them off from the rest of the High Street. It was also felt that gates would spoil the vista looking up the High Street and would obscure part of the War Memorial. So on 24th March, 1997 a packed public meeting was held in the Crown Hotel at which it was obvious that the majority of people present objected to the idea of the gates.

So it was decided to hold a survey to canvass the views of residents. As a result of this the Town Council received 24 letters and 150 phone calls in favour of bollards and seven letters and 39 phone calls in favour of the gates. Despite this at the meeting of the Town Council in June where the matter was discussed 10 councillors voted for the gates and 5 for the bollards. The main argument against the bollards was safety as it was feared that children would run into the road. In addition if the bollards were light-weight they could easily be damaged by ram-raiders and if they were too heavy they would be difficult to move. The Councils recommendation for the gates was then passed to the County Highways Committee.

Not to be deterred on 14th July six electors visited the Town Council Offices and completed a form calling for a town meeting to be held over the council's decision to install gates. At the packed meeting held on 23rd July 10 electors voted for the Town Council to hold a poll on whether to install gates or bollards. Leaflets were produced for and against the bollards. One of the leaflets produced opposing the gates read "Bollards to the Council!"

The referendum was held in September and 1,332 voted for the bollards and 1,144 voted for the gates. The poll cost the Town Council over £3,000.

So on Monday 8th September the Area Highways Committee made up of Stafford Borough councillors and Staffordshire County Councillors voted 5-4 in favour of the bollards.

So today we have the very attractive railings depicting the legend of the founding of Stone and bollards to stop the traffic instead of the proposed gates.

WALTON BRIDGE

It is hard to imagine that the bridge which is now pedestrian was the original bridge that crossed the Trent at Walton. Drivers will remember having to give way to lorries and buses to allow them to cross. There was a separate pedestrian bridge alongside it

There is no documentary evidence as to how long there has been a bridge at this location, but there had always been a ford immediately downstream of it. The first reference to a bridge is in the will of Roger Mareschall, Canon of Lichfield who left £5 for the repair of it in his will dated 1317. The bridge was built in a style known as "Early English" which prevailed from 1189 to 1307, and it is therefore probably of this period, notable features of which are the ribbed arches, which can still be seen today.

It is not known how wide the original bridge was or when some rebuilding took place and the semi-circular arches which are there today were added. It is thought that they date from 1660 when the County gave £20 for the repair of the bridge, which had suffered damage during the floods of the previous year.

Out of interest in the 19th century, offenders were placed in the stocks sited "on" Walton Bridge. The last stocks were made by Isac Dutton, a wheelwright. Hopefully he made a good job of them as by fate he was the first man to be placed in them.

Prior to World War II, a contract was drawn up to build a Stone By-Pass, which included the demolition of the old bridge and building a new one. When war broke out the contract was cancelled.

The new bridge was designed by Mr R Green and the main contractors were Galliford & Sons Ltd.

In conjunction with the new bridge, the existing road had to be re-aligned and widened between Walton Roundabout and Star lock. This meant moving the Walton War Memorial from beside the old bridge to Walton Community Centre.

At the same time as this work was being undertaken the Stone Town Council erected a footbridge over the Scotch Brook to give pedestrian access on to Crown Meadow. The wooden side rails were made by Stone carpenter, George Shufflebottom, and paid for by people subscribing to have an inscription carved on them.

The new bridge was official opened by the County Councillor for Stone, Councillor Michael Shenton on 28th June 1984. The first vehicle to cross the bridge after the opening was a horse drawn dray owned by Galliford's.

Over the years there have been some road schemes which have been proposed and then shelved, one of these was proposed by Fradley's when they were constricting the Aston Lodge housing development. The company propose building a 3 lane road up Pingle Lane and widening the railway bridge for another access onto the estate.

Then Fradley's decided to build a block of retirement homes between Pingle Lane and Jordan Way and the road was shelved. Later the idea of retirement homes was also scrapped and the lane remains as it is today. I hope that the above will be back memories to some readers and will be of interest to others.

Honda Jazz 1.5i MMD Crosstar Advance

Syd Taylor takes the Crosstar, and Vince for a spin

Seldom do manufacturers get it right when naming their motor cars. When they do, the clouds part and the sun shines. A new dawn, a new hope.

My elevated mood is the result of getting to know the cool SUV inspired Jazz Crosstar, with its two tone colour scheme, roof rails, distinctive front grille and elevated ride height. Years back when weekend Dixieland used to fill the smokey air in crowded pubs, a phrase 'HAPPY JAZZ' used to be deployed by the cognoscenti. It denoted music that was sung and played with a smile and received with nods of approval, grins of delight and plenty of feet tapping.

That was then. In today's world pubs have shut, music is the stuff you knew in lifts and neon lit aisles and merriment is prohibited as a public order offence. Oh gloom! But what is this? Why does one smile again? It's simple. You takes the

phrase 'happy jazz', you spins the wheel and before you can say Basin Street Blue's backwards, you have the self charging Honda Jazz Crosstar. Here is a hybrid not ashamed to blow its own trumpet right in the face of market rivals. Huff and puff as they might, they simply turn purple in muted consternation. When it comes to hitting the high notes and gracing the highways and byways with polyrhythmic pleasure, the Jazz Crosstar, with extra ground clearance is the only cool cat in town.



It's so lively and agile to drive, roomy, modern yet comfortingly familiar that behind the wheel you can't help but be happy. None of this detracts from a practical versatility that transforms utilitarian concepts into jolly positives. Lift and fold seating configurations are many and you can fold everything flat to get van-like capacity. So if stuffed giraffes with detachable necks are your bag, you can pack them in here on your way to the Smethwick Natural History Museum.

With this in mind I called in on an old school jazz musician. Vince Pepper plays saxophone with a combo comprising ancient enthusiasts. They call themselves The Swindling Syncopators. They certainly don't swindle their audiences with a playlist of happy jazz anthems. "Wot you doin' 'ere?" He demanded.

"I'm here to show you the new Honda Jazz Crosstar self charging hybrid" "The 'what' jazz?

"It's a car. Fancy a spin?"





Most of the time around town on light load it drives on electric with the engine only coming into play when the batteries need charging so it drives like an all electric car. On the open road and up to speed the engine comes into play unobtrusively. All this combines to take you to near 110mph - while at the same time you enjoy precise and nimble handling and a smooth and quiet ride.

It's packed with the sort of eco-conscious technology that hits the right note today: yet if you enjoy a little up tempo vivacity there is poke enough in sport mode to please those who like it hot.

My reward for introducing Vince to the £28,550 Jazz Crosstar 1.5i-mmd hybrid Advance was an invitation to the next gig by The Swindling Syncopators. This was to take place in a former bank building now converted into a craft gin palace. It all sounded a bit uncertain to me - unlike the Jazz Crosstar with its metronomic pulse of pleasure. Certainly this is the right car with which to banish the day's blues.

"Gimme the lowdown" He said.

I reminded him that the increased ride height had made it easier for him to enter and that the upbeat styling lightens the spirits, pointing out the smart interior that harmonises comfort and practicality - even having water repellent seat fabric.

I showed him the 'lift and fold' capabilities of the 'Magic' seats. He noticed the hidden storage compartments but as a passenger he was denied access to the pleasure the driver gets from the peppy petrol electric hybrid system comprising a 107 PS,1.5 petrol engine that combines beautifully with a 122PS electric motor and smooth CVT transmission. It's probably the best hybrid system yet - as evidenced by the outstanding economy. Honda claims a combined 58.9 mpg overall but that's the understatement of the year. Driving gently in eco mode I got over 75mpg. I could hardly believe it.

Subsequent models, including the hybrid-powered McLaren P1, showcased McLaren's commitment to innovation. Pushing the boundaries with the track-focused McLaren Senna, open-top McLaren Elva, and the zenith of drag-reduction; the McLaren Speedtail.

McLaren's Sport Series debuted a line-up of more accessible sports cars, with the 540C, 570S, and 570GT developed with more creature comforts in mind. Over time, new models joined the ranks starting with the McLaren 600LT in 2018, followed by the 620R in 2019. However, by 2021 the McLaren Artura had become the standard bearer for the Sports Series segment.
